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IDEAS FOR CONDUCTING DRIVES IN YOUR AREA

HOLD OFFICE/CLASS COMPETITIONS!

- □ Select a group/category of items to collect and hold competitions among "teams" to see who raises the most! Who can build the tallest Toilet Paper Pyramid? Who can make the most toiletry kits and blessing bags? Which department collected the most food (by weight – Challenge members to raise their weight in food!)?
- Raise the stakes with fun prizes and BRAGGING RIGHTS! Post photos and progress to Social Media, with hashtags (you can also compete against other groups using the same hashtags!)
- □ Competition hashtag ideas: #TPPyramidVigil2020, #SoapBagsVigil2020, #WeighYourFoodVigil2020, #OOhBabyVigil2020, #BlessingBagsVigil20

HOST GATHERINGS TO CREATE TOILETRY KITS/BLESSING BAGS

- □ Schools, churches, clubs, Girl/Boy Scout Troops can collect items, and hold an event or gathering to put together kits/blessing bags
- □ Kits can include essentials: soap, shampoo, toothpaste, toothbrushes, etc.
- □ You can add special items and notes or inspirational quotes to make them really special!
- □ Bags can be as small as a large Ziploc, or as big as a tote!
- □ Decorate the bags. Get Creative!

ONE-DAY DRIVES AT STORES, ETC.

- Contact your local libraries, supermarkets, shopping centers or malls and request permission to have a drive there on a designated day. (sample letter is provided)
- Hang fliers announcing the drive, and what you will be collecting.
- On the day of the drive, be sure to hang fliers or other information about the drive, Long Island's homeless, and the need for the items you are collecting. A shopping list is included in your kit. You can modify this to show only those items you would like to collect, and hand it out to shoppers before they enter the store. We can provide you with these materials upon request.
- Have members of your group/team/club take shifts, depending on the length of the drive.
- Make sure you have a way of collecting and transporting the items you receive (large boxes, etc.)
- If your team or group has uniforms or jackets, wear them during the drive. If you have a banner, bring it to the drive to represent your group!

ONGOING DRIVES IN LOCAL STORES, LIBRARIES, ETC.

- Contact your local delis, convenience stores and libraries and request permission to place a donation box at their location.
- Decorate a large box with wrapping paper, leaving the top open to collect donations. Be sure to include information about the drive and what items you are collecting.
- Arrange a date and time when you will be picking up the box.





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Want to take your drives to the next level? Look Here for More Ideas! ***Please note: These baskets will be distributed through the LICH "Boutique" - our free distribution center***

Many individuals and families lose all of their belongings when they become homeless. When they are ready to get back on their feet and move into permanent housing, they have to start collecting household items from scratch. Here are some creative, fun ways to create special "housewarming" baskets for formerly homeless individuals and families to get them started in their new homes!

"Spice it Up" Campaign:

Ask friends to help you collect items for families to prepare a special meal, and create "gift baskets" out of new, usable kitchen items they will need to prepare the meal. Here are some examples (gift cards can be added in lieu of perishable food items):

- Large pots with food supplies and a ladle for making a special meal (recipes for the meal would be an added bonus! i.e. Family Pasta Night Basket) Be sure to include any needed spices!
- Cake Mix or items to bake a cake and a wooden spoon in a cake pan (add a recipe to make it personal!)
- Grandma's favorite cookie recipe along with ingredients and a spatula, on a cookie sheet
- Stove casserole mix or special recipe with a skillet or pan and spatula

"Fresh Start" Campaign:

Ask friends to help you collect items to help families get started in their new homes. Here are some examples of "Fresh Start" Baskets:

- Laundry baskets with laundry cleaning items, dryer sheets
- Buckets with cleaning supplies, gloves, dust pans, mop, sponges, etc.
- Dish pan and dish drain with gloves, sponges, Brillo and dish washing liquid
- Bath set with shampoo, conditioner, soap, etc., in a bath caddy or some kind of bin that could be used for storage.
- Diaper bag or baby bath filled with baby items, diapers, baby shampoo, etc.

"Home Sweet Home" Campaign:

- New sheet sets, towel sets, pillows in a laundry basket
- New kitchen towels and pot holders in a bucket or dish pan



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WHAT TO EXPECT AT THE VIGIL

The Vigil will be taking place on March 17, 2020, from 12 Noon – 8:00PM at Farmingdale State College. It will take place in the Multi-Purpose Room (old gym) and Great Lawn in Roosevelt Hall.

The event will be broken up into two parts:

12 noon - 5PM:

Health Fair, Information Tables, Services (Haircuts, face painting, Voter Registration, 20202 Census Support) and Distribution of Essential Items. This will take place in the Multipurpose Room. Agencies and groups will have tables with information about their programs and services; groups will be on hand to do health screenings for various conditions including cancer, hearing, oral health, blood pressure, cholesterol and HIV. Barbers and hair dressers will provide free haircuts. Face painting and Story Time will be available for the children. The Nassau and Suffolk Boards of Elections will be on hand to assist folks with registering to vote and demonstrating how to use voting machines. There will also a table to help people complete Census forms (online Census forms are available beginning March 12). Folks will be guided through the services, info and health fair. They will then be escorted through the Distribution area and assisted in obtaining what they need.

(5PM – 7PM: a light dinner will be offered to volunteers and those who stay for the fair and ceremony)

<u>7PM − 8PM:</u>

Candle Lighting Ceremony and Vigil. We invite members of the community to join us to raise awareness about homelessness and poverty on Long Island. Presentations by homeless and formerly homeless persons, elected officials and others serving the homeless community.


Inside, we will have information tables, areas to get a snack or hot coffee or cocoa, and places to hang your banners and meet up with group members.

Outside, we'll have designated areas for dropping off various items donated through the drives conducted by members of the community.

We will hold the Candle Lighting Ceremony just outside on the Great Lawn, weather permitting. In the event of inclement weather, the ceremony will be held in the Multipurpose Room.

Groups are encouraged to bring banners, signs, etc., and/or wear items to represent their groups (group/club/team/school uniforms). We encourage folks to post photos with the Hashtag #Vigil2020

It will likely be CHILLY OUTSIDE! Be sure to dress warm, including wearing layers, gloves, hats, scarves, and thick-soled shoes.





Vigil Honoring Homeless Lightens Long Island Hearts

Greta Guarton first spoke about the event she recently coordinated, the "Have a Heart for the Homeless Candlelight Vigil," while running frantically around Long Island the day before with a colleague.

Guarton is the Executive Director of the Long Island Coalition for the Homeless (LICH), formerly the Nassau-Suffolk Coalition for the Homeless. LICH is a non-profit organization that has worked for over 20 years to end homelessness on Long Island and improve the quality of life for all of the area's residents. The LICH network now includes over 125 agencies, which provide an array of services to Long Island's needy families and individuals.

Cell phone crackling as she jumped in and out of her car in the mounds of snow that arrived just before the event, Guarton was still nothing but excited and enthusiastic. The Vigil was restarted about four years ago after a 15-year break, and she shared her eagerness to "create the new face" of the Vigil.

"We used to have an hour-long ceremony out-doors," she said, "but now it's held mostly inside, and the candlelight ceremony is just a part of what we do." The Vigil, which took place at the State University of New York's (SUNY) Farming-dale campus on February 11, attracted close to 1,500 people this year.

One service provider who attended both this year and in 2009, Christine Lai, of Catholic Charities Diocese of Rockville Centre, spoke about her experience providing in-kind donations for this event, and about the changes she saw from the previous year.

"Catholic Charities also offered a new item this year. We made gift baskets, which would help an individual or family who would be moving into permanent housing to set up a new home, and we offered several food baskets, as well. These baskets were raffled off; however, each attendee who stopped by our table was given a free ticket. I was touched by the responses of the people who won their baskets. To see the happy faces as they won these basic items was moving," recounted Lai.

The Vigil takes place around Valentine's Day, both because of the cold winter weather (the hardest time of year for the homeless) and because of the clear symbolism of the holiday. It has become an entirely new event over the past four years, transforming into a lively evening that engages the entire community, and not limiting attendance to any one group of the many affected by homelessness.

Hundreds of organizations around the country hold candlelight vigils for the homeless, to honor those that have died on the streets or to



raise public consciousness of this overlooked group, like National Homeless Persons' Memorial Day (December 21, the longest night of the year). The "Have a Heart" Vigil though, is not just about honoring the homeless, but also about distributing information and practical help, spreading empathy and understanding, and raising awareness about this critical issue. Few groups take their commemorative events as far as Guarton and her colleagues at the LICH.

In addition to the candlelight ceremony, the Vigil included an array of events for both adults and children, such as formerly homeless individuals sharing their personal experiences, tables of information with representatives from service agencies, and a distribution of donations (400 new winter coats, 2,000 pairs of socks, nonperishable food items, school supplies, linens, and toiletries). In order to better connect with the families and children the event has attracted, this year LICH also decided to hold its first ever story time for its younger participants.

"I thought it went really well," she noted. "A lot of the kids who were there stayed for multiple stories and we may make it more prominent next year."

The teenage volunteers who read books to the children to teach them about the struggles of the homeless were energetic and engrossed the children. They also made sure the kids and their parents knew where to pick up complimentary copies of the stories they had just heard.

"Many of our program participants are families with children who live on a very low income," said Lai of Catholic Charities. "Sometimes, the extra money to even purchase a book for their child is out of reach for our families. We were happy to bring those books back and offer them to the children in our programs."

One of the stories volunteers read to the children was *Saily's Journey*, the tale of Saily the

snail, who becomes homeless after a storm and consequently sets off on an adventure to find a new home.

A few extremely brave and formerly homeless individuals told stories geared toward the adults in attendance, too.

"It is important for them to share that story and take pride in what they've accomplished, and it's also good for everyone else to hear."

Aside from first-hand accounts and inspiring stories, there was also practical information available to those in need of assistance from nearly a dozen local service providers and advocacy groups.

The "Have a Heart for the Homeless Candlelight Vigil" is an event that has grown to include an entire community in Long Island—the homeless, formerly homeless, families with children, service providers, and even the media. Some participants traveled long distances to be able to attend, like one man who had to take two buses and walk quite a ways in order to make it to the Vigil on that snowy February night. Even with his difficulties traveling to the SUNY Farmingdale campus, he seemed to think the Vigil was worth the trek, as did the numerous other families, providers and individuals who, regardless of the bad weather came to be a part of it.

Such dedication says a lot about what the Vigil means to the community, and its organizers hope to continue the event's growth in the future. But of course, there are still plenty of other events and advocacy work to keep Guarton and her team at LICH busy in the meantime.
